More than 500 of the Ekka's best animals will be on show in the Grand Parade on the 13 August at 1:30pm in the Main Arena.

The Grand Parade is a parade of champions. From the tiny Grand Champion fish to the huge Grand Champion bull. There are ribbon-winning goats, beef cattle, dairy cattle, cats, dogs, horses and alpacas.

These are all extraordinary sights to see at the Grand Parade. It also features winners from the Flower, Garden, Arts and Cookery sections.

The Ekka's Grand Parade is a highlight of the Royal Queensland Show. It is a traditional event with roots tracing back to the first Ekka in 1896. It

In previous years Peter exhibited two cattle, one of them being the Supreme Champion in all breeds. The best part of attending the Grand Parade for is hearing people cheering and clapping. He thinks the hardest part is having to be in the sun for one or two hours and not being able to have any water during the parade.

"I think it is very important to build a connection between our country people and the people in the city. That's what we're here for," said Mr Garratt.
